Partnerships Help Beautify PCS Grounds

The grounds of Phillip C. Showell Elementary School in Selbyville are undergoing a transformation this fall thanks to a pair of community partnerships.

PCS has partnered with Healthy Foods for Healthy Kids and Coastal Gardeners to build a new school garden with raised beds. All students in Grades K-5 will plant seeds and maintain the garden throughout the school year.

In early-September, volunteers from HFHK, Coastal Gardeners, Inland Bays Garden Center and Delaware Botanic Gardens built the beds and a maintenance shed at the school. Soil was provided by Millville Organic Center.

Students began planting their new school garden during the week of Sept. 20.

In addition, PCS was selected in July as a Lowe's 100 Hometowns project and received \$100,000 for new equipment for its playground. The school was nominated by a member of its PTO organization and was one of just 100 impact projects nationwide to be selected from a pool of more than 2,200 submissions.

Sussex Central High School has been named a Delaware World Language Proficiency Champion School.


SCHS world language teachers Renata Turcan, Robert Wilgus, Cristal Wright, Gilberto Huerta, Francisco Reyes Matuz, Linda Hooks and Deziree Gardner successfully completed their Proficiency

Champion training through online modules with Avant Advance that deepened their understanding of what it means to be proficient in another language.

The modules focused on identifying key patterns of proficiency in student work and assigning different levels of proficiency to each written sample. Upon the completion of the modules

and a final certification assessment, each teacher received 15 clock hours and a certificate recognizing them as a "Delaware Proficiency Champion."

During the Delaware World Language Teacher Leader Network meeting in October, the teachers will receive a special banner to display in the hallway at SCHS.

schools where students master challenging and engaging content. Now in its 39th year, the National Blue Ribbon Schools Program has bestowed approximately 10,000 awards to more than 9,000 schools.

Up to 420 schools may be nominated each year. The Department invites National Blue Ribbon Schools nominations from the top education official in all states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, the Department of Defense Education Activity, and the Bureau of Indian Education. Private schools are nominated by the Council for American Private Education.

SDSA was a winner in the Exemplary High Performing Schools category.

The Indian River School District's other Blue Ribbon Award winners are Selbyville Middle School (2018), East Millsboro Elementary School (2008, 2017), Long Neck Elemen-
