

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Expansion Projects Progressing

Construction is continuing on Phase One of the building expansion projects approved by Indian River School District residents in a major capital improvement referendum on January 29, 2013.

North Georgetown, Long Neck and East Millsboro elementary schools are each receiving eight additional classrooms in Phase One.

At North Georgetown, exterior work is nearly complete and the building has been enclosed. Interior work is progressing, and the project is on pace for completion in late-November.

At East Millsboro, roof work is complete and windows *Continued on Page 4*

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JMC Named National Blue Ribbon School

John M. Clayton Elementary School in Frankford was one of three schools in Delaware and 337 nationwide to be named a National Blue Ribbon School for 2014.

This is the second time that John M. Clayton Elementary (formerly Frankford Elementary) has received this national honor. It also won the award in 2004. Overall, it is the Indian River School District's eighth National Blue Ribbon Award since 2001.

"John M. Clayton Elementary has set an exemplary example for public schools across the country," Superintendent Susan Bunting said. "Each year, its teachers and staff work tirelessly to make sure that students facing a variety of demographic and economic

IRSD Accepting Choice Applications for '15-16

The Indian River School District is accepting school choice applications for the 2015-2016 school year.

The application deadline for students in Grades 1-12 is **Wednesday, January 14, 2015 at 4:00 p.m.** Parents must submit a Delaware Standard Application for Educational Options, along with an Indian River School District Choice Student Supplemental Information Form. These forms are available on the district web site: irsd.net.

Application forms should be mailed to Indian River School District, Attn: School Choice, 31 Hosier Street, Selbyville, DE 19975.

All school choice applications will be either approved or disapproved by the Indian River Board of Education at its regular meeting on February 23, 2015. Applications will not be considered by the Board on a monthly basis prior to the February meeting.

The district has the right to disapprove an application

based on building capacity or the student's discipline and/or attendance record.

Applications received after the January 14 deadline will be considered only if "good cause" circumstances exist. These circumstances include a change in the child's residence due to a change in family residence; a change in the state in which a family resides; a change in a parent's martial status; the location of child care services; a change in residence caused by

a guardianship proceeding, placement of the child in foster care, adoption or participation by the child in a foreign exchange program; a reported and recorded instance of bullying against the child as defined in Delaware Code; or participation by the child in a substance abuse or mental health treatment program.

Parents enrolling their child in kindergarten are encouraged to submit a school choice application by April 30, 2015 at 4:00 p.m. for consideration by the Board of Educa-

right to submit a school choice application for kindergarten up until the first day of the 2015-2016 school year if capacity at the choice school exists.

program recognizes schools in two performance categories – Exemplary High Performing Schools and Exemplary Achievement Gap Closing Schools. High Performing Schools are among the best in their state as measured by scores on state assessments or nationally-normed tests. Exemplary Achievement Gap Closing Schools are recognized for closing achievement gaps between the various ethnic and socioeconomic student subgroups.

John M. Clayton Elementary was a winner in the Exemplary High Performing Schools category. Despite having large percentages of minority and economically-disadvantaged students, JMC has consistently performed well on state assessments. In 2014, it was praised by the state for its efforts in closing achievement gaps among student subgroups. The percentage of African-American and Hispanic students at JMC who met performance standards in math and reading consistently exceeded the state average.

have been installed. Interior and site work is progressing, and the project is slated for completion in late-December.

At Long Neck, roof installation and exterior brick work are progressing. The installation of windows and the enclosure of the building will follow. The project is tentatively scheduled for completion in mid-January.

Phase Two, which will be completed in 2015, is currently in the design and development stage. It will include the addition of eight classrooms and a new kitchen at the Georgetown Elementary/Georgetown Middle School complex, four classrooms at Phillip C. Showell Elementary School and two classrooms at Selbyville Middle School.

The Selbyville Middle School and Phillip C. Showell Elementary School projects are tentatively slated to go to bid in January. The Georgetown Elementary/Georgetown Middle School project is ready for state agency review and will likely go to bid in March.

Beahan has been an employee of the Indian River School District for 33 years. He began his career as a music teacher at Selbyville Middle School in 1981. He held that post until 2005 when he accepted a music teacher position at Southern Delaware School of the Arts. In 2007, he became an assistant principal at Sussex Central High School. He has been the principal of Southern Delaware School of the Arts since 2009.

In October, Beahan attended a special ceremony in Dover during which Delaware Gov. Jack Markell signed a proclamation designating October as Principal Recognition Month.
